1. Summary

This Licensing Sub-Committee is required to consider an objection notice given by Environmental Health to a temporary event notice (TEN) given for:

The Greenhouse, 52 High Street, Bridgnorth, WV16 4DX

Shropshire Council being the authorised licensing authority for the above premises has been given a temporary event notice.

The notice has been accepted as valid and during the statutory consultation period a valid objection notice was received. The objection notice is therefore required to be considered by way of a hearing of the Licensing Sub-Committee to determine if the licensable activities proposed on the TEN may be carried out.

In considering the objection and determining the notice, the licensing authority must give appropriate weight to:

- the steps that are necessary to promote the licensing objectives;
- the representations (including supporting information) presented by all parties;
- Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003;
- Shropshire Council's Licensing Policy 2024 - 2029.

After considering all the relevant issues the Licensing Authority must make a decision in accordance with paragraphs 9 and 10 of this report.

Following the hearing, the Licensing Authority should give its decision and provide reasons to support it. This will be important if there is an appeal by any of the parties.

All parties are required to be notified of the decision and that decision should be accompanied by information on the right of the party to appeal.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 That the Sub-Committee considers the objection notice and determines the notice in accordance with the statutory guidance issued under s182 of the Licensing Act 2003, the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy 2024 - 2029, the information contained within this report, the supporting documentation in the appendices and having had due regard to the applicant and the parties/authorised bodies making relevant representations.
- 2.2 That the Sub-Committee makes their determination in accordance with the options in paragraph 9 of this report.
- 2.3 That the Sub-Committee provides the reasons for its decision.

Report

6. Purpose of report

- 6.1 To consider the objection notice given for a temporary event notice at The Greenhouse, 52 High Street, Bridgnorth, WV16 4DX, and determine the notice (A location map and location photographs can be found at **Appendix A and B**).

7. Background

- 7.1 Paul Atkins, the premises user, has given a temporary event notice to have effect on Saturday 5 September 2026 between 14:00 and 20:30.

The notice states the nature of the event as an outdoor music event with a DJ and seeks to authorise the following licensable activities in the garden area at the rear of the premises, which is described as a cocktail bar and restaurant:

- The supply of alcohol (on the premises)
- The provision of regulated entertainment

The current premises licence does not have effect in this area of the premises for the proposed activities during the proposed times:

The maximum capacity for attendees at the event is given as 499, this number includes those attending the event and any staff and entertainers (The submitted TEN and existing premises licence can be found at **Appendix C and Appendix D**).

- 7.2 TENs are a temporary authorisation to carry out licensable activities on unlicensed premises, or to add activities and extend the hours of an existing licence. The only statutory consultees for TENs are the Police and Environmental Health, they may give an objection notice to the TEN if they are satisfied that allowing the premises to be used in accordance with the notice would undermine a licensing objective, the objection notice must state the reasons for being so satisfied.

8. Representations received (Responsible Authorities)

- 8.1 Environmental Health gave an objection notice for this TEN on the grounds that they are satisfied that allowing the use of the premises in accordance with the notice would undermine the prevention of public nuisance licensing objective (The objection notice can be found at **Appendix E**).
- 8.2 In their objection notice, Environmental Health site noise complaints from neighbouring residential premises during other similar events, the results of noise monitoring during other similar events undertaken by environmental health officers and the recent service of a noise abatement notice under the Environmental Protection Act 1990 served on the company which owns the premises (Cocktail Club Ltd) as relevant contributing factors to their decision to serve an objection notice for this TEN.

9. Options for Consideration

- 9.1 The options available to the Licensing Sub-Committee having considered all the relevant information are as follows:
- Give a counter notice, preventing the proposed activities taking place
 - Not give a counter notice, allowing the proposed activities to take place
 - Impose relevant conditions from those already attached to the existing premises licence on the TEN, allowing the proposed activities to take place in line with those conditions.
- 9.2 Members of the Sub-Committee should be advised that the premises user giving the notice and any other person who made relevant representations in relation to the notice may appeal against the decision made to the Magistrates' Court within 21 days of the date on which they were notified.

10. Standard of Decision Making

- 10.1 In accordance with the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003 and the Council's scheme of delegation, where an objection notice has been given for a TEN the Council must hold a hearing to consider the objection notice.

- 10.2 When considering the objection and determining the notice, the Sub-Committee must only consider issues relating to one or more of the licensing objectives. The licensing objectives are:
- The prevention of crime and disorder
 - Public safety
 - The prevention of public nuisance
 - The protection of children from harm
- 10.3 Members of the Sub-Committee must have regard to the statutory guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy. Members of the Sub-Committee may deviate from the statutory guidance and licensing policy only if they deem that there is good reason to do so.
- 10.4 Members of the Sub-Committee should not allow themselves to predetermine the application or to be prejudiced in favour of or against the notice and shall only determine the notice having considered all relevant information.

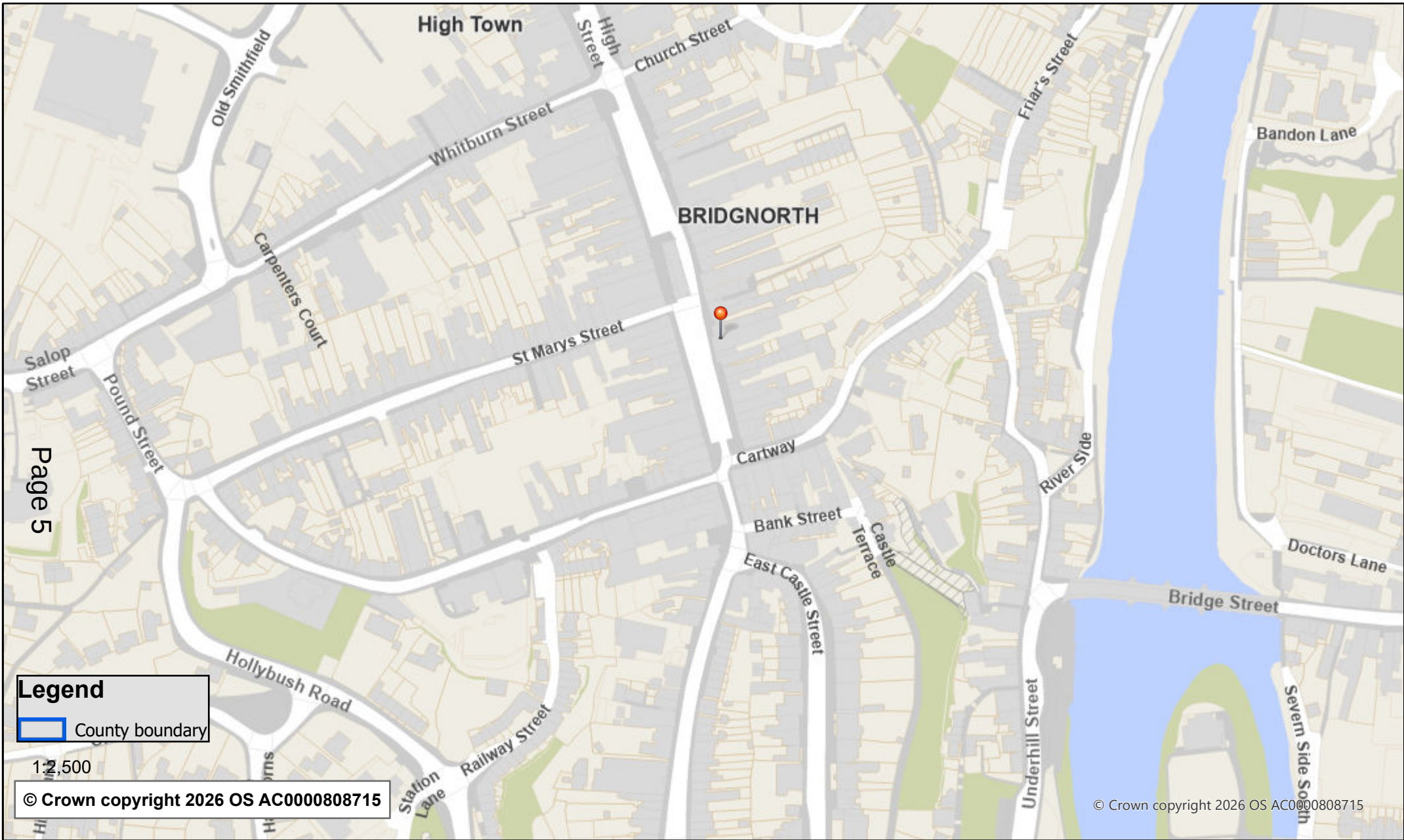

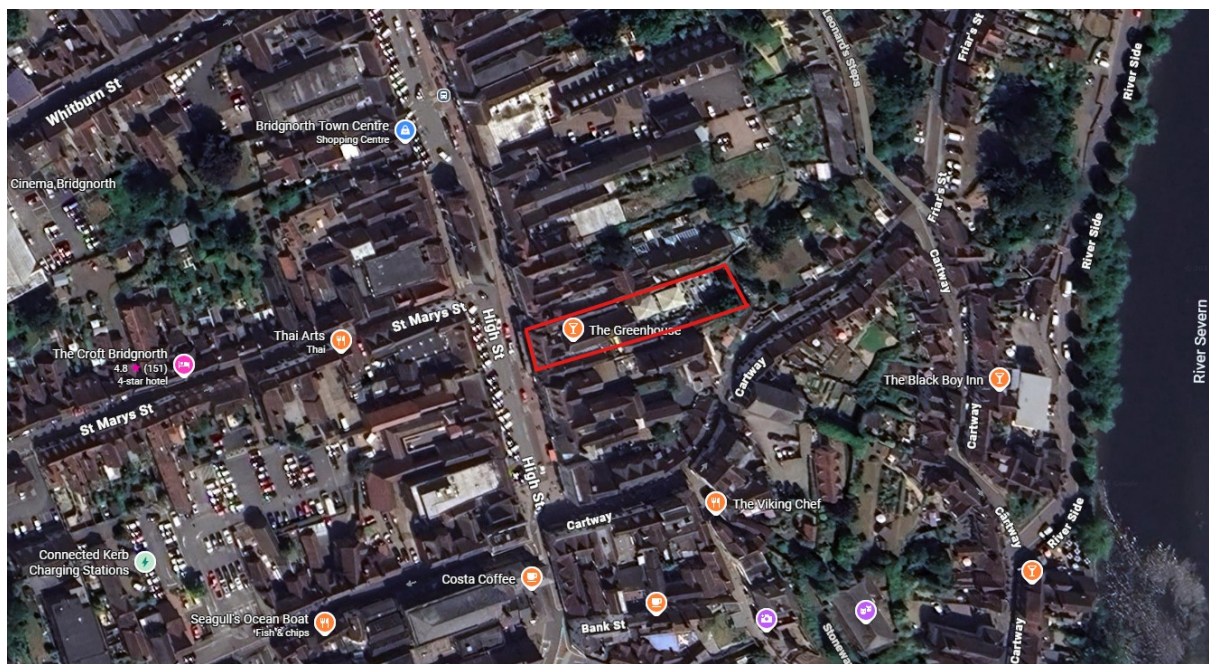

Temporary Event Notice Procedure Notes

- In order for your temporary event notice application to be accepted you **must** ensure you complete the following steps:
 - Send one copy of the completed temporary event notice form to the Licensing Team at the address above.

The form **must** be received by the Licensing Authority at least **ten working days** prior to the event (in addition to the day the notice is received and the day of the event). The licensing team will notify Environmental Health that an application has been received.

- Enclosed the fee or a copy of the receipt if the fee has been paid online (cheques made payable to Shropshire Council). A full list of the fees is available at www.shropshire.gov.uk.
- Send one completed copy of the temporary event notice form to the Chief Officer of the Police at the following address:

Notes for Guidance

General

In these notes, a person who gives a temporary event notice is called a “premises user”.

The police and local authority exercising environmental health functions may intervene on the grounds of any of the four licensing objectives (the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, the prevention of public nuisance, and the protection of children from harm) to prevent the occurrence of an event at which permitted temporary activities are to take place or to agree a modification of the arrangements for such an event. However, the licensing authority will intervene of its own volition in the cases described below.

First, it will issue a counter notice if there is an objection to a late temporary event notice (see note 8 below).

Secondly, it may issue a notice in relation to its decision to impose conditions on a temporary event notice (see note 2 below).

Thirdly, it will issue a counter notice if the first, second, third and fifth of the limits set out below would be exceeded. If any of the limits below are breached or if a counter notice has been issued, any licensable activities taking place would be unauthorised and the premises user would be liable to prosecution. The limitations apply to:

- the number of times a person may give a temporary event notice (50 times per year for a personal licence holder and 5 times per year for other people);
- the number of times a person may give a late temporary event notice (10 times per year for a personal licence holder and 2 times per year for other people);
- the number of times a temporary event notice may be given in respect of any particular premises (15 times or, for event periods occurring wholly or partly in 2022 or 2023, 20 times a calendar year);
- the length of time a temporary event may last for these purposes (168 hours or 7 days);
- the maximum aggregate duration of the periods covered by temporary event notices at any individual premises (21 days or, for event periods (or any part of those periods) occurring in 2022 or 2023, 26 days per calendar year); and
- the scale of the event in terms of the maximum number of people attending at any one time (a maximum of 499).

For the purposes of determining the overall limits of 50 temporary event notices per personal licence holder (in a calendar year) and of 5 for a non-personal licence holder (in a calendar year), temporary event notices given by an associate or a person who is in business with a premises user (and that business involves carrying on licensable activities) count towards those totals. The limits applying to late temporary event notices are included within the overall limits applying to the total number of temporary event notices. Note 16 below sets out the definition of an “associate”.

When permitted temporary activities take place, a premises user must ensure that either:

- a copy of the temporary event notice is prominently displayed at the premises; or
- the temporary event notice is kept at the premises either in his own custody or in the custody of a person present and working at the premises and whom he has nominated for that purpose.

Where the temporary event notice is in the custody of a nominated person, a notice specifying that fact and the position held by that person must be displayed prominently at the premises.

Where the temporary event notice or a notice specifying the nominated person is not displayed, a constable or an authorised person (for example, a licensing officer, fire officer or environmental

health officer) may require the premises user to produce the temporary event notice for examination. Similarly, where the nominated person has the temporary event notice in his custody, a constable or authorised person may require that person to produce it for examination. Failure to produce the temporary event notice without reasonable excuse would be an offence.

It should also be noted that the following, among other things, are offences under the Licensing Act 2003:

- the sale or supply of alcohol to children under 18 years of age (subject to an unlimited fine on conviction);
- allowing the sale of alcohol to children under 18 (subject to an unlimited fine on conviction);
- knowingly allowing the consumption of alcohol on the premises by a person aged under 18 (subject to an unlimited fine, on conviction);
- allowing disorderly behaviour on the premises (subject to a fine not exceeding level 3 on the standard scale, on conviction);
- the sale of alcohol to a person who is drunk (subject to a fine not exceeding level 3 on the standard scale, on conviction);
- obtaining alcohol for a person who is drunk (subject to a fine not exceeding level 3 on the standard scale, on conviction);
- knowingly allowing a person aged under 18 to make any sale or supply of alcohol unless the sale or supply has been specifically approved by the premises user or any individual aged 18 or over who has been authorised for this purpose by the premises user (subject to a fine not exceeding level 1 on the standard scale, on conviction); and
- knowingly keeping or allowing to be kept on the premises any smuggled goods which have been imported without payment of duty or which have otherwise been unlawfully imported (subject to a fine not exceeding level 3 on the standard scale, on conviction).

In addition, where the premises are to be used primarily or exclusively for the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises, it is an offence to allow children under 16 to be present when the premises are open for that purpose unless they are accompanied by an adult. In the case of any premises at which sales or supplies of alcohol are taking place at all, it is an offence for a child under 16 to be present there between the hours of midnight and 5am unless accompanied by an adult. In both instances, the penalty on conviction is a fine not exceeding level 3 on the standard scale, currently £1,000.

Note 1

A temporary event notice may only be given by an individual and not, for example, by an organisation or club or business. The individual giving the notice is the proposed “premises user”. Within businesses, clubs or organisations, one individual will therefore need to be identified as the proposed premises user.

If you include an e-mail address in section 1(7) or 1(9), the licensing authority may send to this the acknowledgement of receipt of your notice or any notice or counter notice it is required to give under sections 104A, 106A or 107 of the Licensing Act 2003.

Note 2

For the purposes of the Licensing Act 2003, “premises” means any place. Premises will therefore not always be a building with a formal address and postcode. Premises can include, for example, public parks, recreation grounds and private land.

If a premises licence or club premises certificate has effect in relation to the premises (or any part of the premises) which you want to use to carry on licensable activities, it is possible that any conditions which apply to the licence or certificate may be imposed on the temporary event notice if certain pre-conditions are met. These pre-conditions are that the police or the local authority exercising environmental health functions object to the notice and the licensing authority decides:

- not to give a counter notice under section 105 of the Licensing Act 2003;
- the conditions apply to the licence or certificate; and
- the imposition of the conditions on the notice would not be inconsistent with the carrying on of the licensable activities under the notice.

Note 3

A temporary event notice can be given for part of a building, such as a single room or a plot within a larger area of land. You should provide a clear description of the area in which you propose to carry on licensable activities. This is important as any licensable activities conducted outside the area of the premises protected by the authority of this temporary event notice would be unlawful and could lead to prosecution.

In addition, when holding the proposed event, the premises user would need to be able to restrict the number of people on the premises at any one time when licensable activities are taking place to less than 500. If more than 499 are on the premises when licensable activities are being carried on, the licensable activities would be unlawful and the premises user would be liable to prosecution. The maximum figure of 499 includes, for example, staff, organisers, stewards and performers.

Note 4

A description of the nature of the premises assists the chief officer of police and local authority exercising environmental health functions in deciding if any issues relating to the licensing objectives are likely to arise. You should state clearly that the premises to be used are, for example, a public house, a restaurant, an open field, a village hall or a beer tent.

Note 5

A description of the nature of the event similarly assists the chief officer of police and local authority exercising environmental health functions in making a decision as to whether or not to make an objection. You should state clearly that the event taking place at the premises would be, for example, a wedding with a pay bar, the supply of beer at a particular farmers' market, a discotheque, the performance of a string quartet, a folk group or a rock band.

Note 6

The licensable activities are:

- the sale by retail of alcohol;
- the supply of alcohol by or on behalf of a club to, or to the order of, a member of a club;
- the provision of regulated entertainment; and
- the provision of late night refreshment.

Note 7

Regulated entertainment, subject to specified conditions and exemptions, includes:

- (a) a performance of a play;
- (b) an exhibition of a film;
- (c) an indoor sporting event;
- (d) a boxing or wrestling entertainment;
- (e) a performance of live music;
- (f) any playing of recorded music;
- (g) a performance of dance; and
- (h) entertainment of a similar description to that falling within (e), (f) or (g).

In terms of specific regulated entertainments please note that:

- Plays: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
- Dance: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500. However, a performance which amounts to adult entertainment remains licensable.
- Films: no licence is required for 'not-for-profit' film exhibition held in community premises between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day provided that the audience does not exceed 500 and the organiser (a) gets consent to the screening

from a person who is responsible for the premises; and (b) ensures that each such screening abides by age classification ratings.

- Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000. Combined fighting sports – defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or wrestling with one or more martial arts – are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
 - a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
 - a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.
- Recorded Music: no licence permission is required for:
 - any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school proprietor or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.
- Cross activity exemptions: no licence is required between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, with no limit on audience size for:
 - any entertainment taking place on the premises of the local authority where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the local authority;
 - any entertainment taking place on the hospital premises of the health care provider where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the health care provider;
 - any entertainment taking place on the premises of the school where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the school proprietor; and
 - any entertainment (excluding films and a boxing or wrestling entertainment) taking place at a travelling circus, provided that (a) it takes place within a moveable structure that accommodates the audience, and (b) that the travelling circus has not been located on the same site for more than 28 consecutive days.

If you are uncertain whether or not the activities that you propose are licensable, you should contact your licensing authority for further advice.

Note 8

Late notices can be given no later than 5 working days but no earlier than 9 working days before the event in relation to which the notice is given. A late notice given later than 5 working days before the event to which it relates will be returned as void and the activities described in it will not be authorised.

The number of late notices that can be given in any one calendar year is limited to 10 for personal licence holders and 2 for non-personal licence holders. These count towards the total number of temporary event notices (i.e. 50 temporary event notices per year for personal licence holders and 5 temporary event notices for non-personal licence holders).

If there is an objection from either the police or local authority exercising environmental health functions, the event will not go ahead and a counter notice will be issued.

Note 9

The maximum period for using premises for licensable activities under the authority of a temporary event notice is 168 hours or seven days.

Note 10

You should state here the times during the event period, for example 48 hours, when you intend to carry on licensable activities. For example, you may not intend to carry on licensable activities throughout the entire 48-hour event period, and may intend to sell alcohol between 8.00 hrs and 23.00 hrs on each of the two days.

Note 11

No more than 499 may be on the premises for a temporary event at any one time when licensable activities are being carried on. If you intend to have more than 499 attending the event, you should obtain a premises licence for the event. Your licensing authority should be able to advise you. The maximum figure of 499 includes not only the audience, spectators or consumers but also, for example, staff, organisers, stewards and performers who will be present on the premises.

Note 12

If you indicate that alcohol will be supplied only for consumption on the premises, you would be required to ensure that no person leaves the premises with alcohol supplied there. If such a supply takes place, the premises user may be liable to prosecution for carrying on an unauthorised licensable activity. Similarly, if the premises user gives notice that only supplies of alcohol for consumption off the premises will take place, he/she must ensure that alcohol supplied is not consumed on the premises. The premises user is free to give notice that he/she intends to carry on both types of supplies. For this purpose, the supply of alcohol includes both of the first two licensable activities listed in note 6 above.

Note 13

Relevant entertainment is defined in the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982 (“the 1982 Act”) as *any live performance or any live display of nudity which is of such a nature that, ignoring financial gain, it must reasonably be assumed to be provided solely or principally for the purpose of sexually stimulating any member of the audience (whether by verbal or other means)*. Relevant entertainment therefore includes, but is not limited to, lap dancing and pole dancing.

The 1982 Act requires premises which provide relevant entertainment to be licensed under that Act for this purpose. Premises at which there have not been more than eleven occasions on which such entertainment has been provided within a period of 12 months, no such occasion has lasted for more than 24 hours and there has been a period of at least one month between each such occasion are exempt from the requirement to obtain a licence under the 1982 Act. Such premises are likely instead to require an authorisation under the Licensing Act 2003 to be used for such activities as these are a licensable activity (the provision of regulated entertainment — see note 6 above). A temporary event notice may be given for this purpose.

Note 14

The holder of a valid personal licence issued under the Licensing Act 2003 may give up to 50 temporary event notices in any calendar year subject to the other limitations in the 2003 Act. A proposed premises user who holds such a licence should give the details requested.

Note 15

As stated under Note 14, a personal licence holder (issued under the Licensing Act 2003) may give up to 50 temporary event notices (including 10 late notices) in any calendar year. An individual who does not hold a personal licence may only give 5 temporary event notices (including 2 late notices) in England and Wales in any calendar year. A calendar year is the period between 1st January to 31st December inclusive in any year.

If an event straddles two calendar years, it will count against the limits on temporary event notices for each year. However, only one notice needs to be given. The limits are:

- i. for event periods occurring wholly or partly in 2022 or 2023, up to 20 times in the calendar year for each premises;
- ii. for other event periods, 15 times in a calendar year for each premises;
- iii. for event periods (or any part of a period) occurring in 2022 or 2023, 26 days in the calendar year for each premises;
- iv. for other event periods, 21 days in a calendar year for each premises;
- v. 50 per personal licence holder each calendar year; and
- vi. 5 for non-holders each calendar year.

For the purposes of determining the overall limits of 50 temporary event notices per personal licence holder (in a calendar year) and of 5 for a non-personal licence holder (in a calendar year), temporary event notices given by an associate or a person who is in business with a premises user (and that business involves carrying on licensable activities) count towards those totals. Note 16 below sets out the definition of an “associate”.

If a temporary event notice has been given for the same premises, by the same premises user, and would have effect within 24 hours before the start of the event period under the current proposal or within 24 hours after the end of that period, the temporary event notice given would be void and any licensable activities carried on under it would therefore be unlicensed.

For the purposes of determining whether or not the required gap of 24 hours is upheld, temporary event notices given by an associate or a person who is in business with a premises user (and that business involves carrying on licensable activities) count as if they had been given by the premises user. Note 16 below sets out the definition of an “associate”.

Note 16

An “associate” of the proposed premises user is:

- a. the spouse or civil partner of that person;
- b. a child, parent, grandchild, grandparent, brother or sister of that person;
- c. an agent or employee of that person; or
- d. the spouse or civil partner of a person within (b) or (c).

For these purposes, a person living with another as that person’s husband or wife is to be treated as that person’s spouse.

Note 17

It is a requirement that you send at least one copy of this notice to the licensing authority at least ten working days (or five working days for a late notice) before the commencement of the proposed licensable activities. The authority will give you written acknowledgement of the receipt of the notice. This will be important proof that you gave the notice and when you gave it for the purposes of the Act. Some premises may be situated in two licensing authority areas, for example, where a building or field straddles the local authority boundary. Where this is the case, at least one copy of the notice must be sent to each of the licensing authorities identified, together with the appropriate fee in each case. In such circumstances, you will receive acknowledgements from all the relevant licensing authorities.

One copy must be sent to each of the chief officer of police and the local authority exercising environmental health functions for the area in which the premises is situated at least ten working

days for a standard notice (or five working days for a late notice) before the commencement of the proposed licensable activities. Where the premises are situated in two police areas or environmental health areas, a further copy will need to be sent to the further police force and local authority exercising environmental health functions.

Note 18

Under the Licensing Act 2003, all temporary event notices are given subject to a mandatory condition requiring that where the licensable activities involve the supply of alcohol, all such supplies must be made by or under the authority of the named premises user. If there is a breach of this condition, the premises user and the individual making the supply in question would be liable to prosecution. For this purpose, the supply of alcohol includes both of the first two licensable activities listed in note 6 above.

Note 19

It is an offence knowingly or recklessly to make a false statement in, or in connection with, a temporary event notice. (A person is to be treated as making a false statement if he produces, furnishes, signs or otherwise makes use of a document that contains a false statement.) To do so could result in prosecution and an unlimited fine.

Note 20

You should not complete section 10 of the notice, which is for use by the licensing authority. It may complete this section as one means of giving you written acknowledgement of its receipt of the notice.

ANNEX 1 - MANDATORY CONDITIONS

Licensing Act 2003

For the supply of alcohol

No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence -

- (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or their personal licence is suspended.

Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

Exhibition of films

For all premises licences and club premises certificate authorising the exhibition of films, access will be restricted only to those who meet the required age limit in line with any certificate granted by the British Board of Film Classification.

Admission of children to the exhibition of any film to be restricted in accordance with the recommendations given to films by a body designated under Section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984 - the British Board of Film Classification is the only body so designated.

Door Supervision

Where a premises licence includes a condition that at specified times one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity, each such individual must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

Mandatory Drinks Code Conditions

1. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to—
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or,
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise); .
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
 - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
2. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
3. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served

alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—

(a) a holographic mark, or

(b) an ultraviolet feature.

4. The responsible person must ensure that—

(a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures— .

(i) beer or cider: ½ pint;

(ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and

(iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml.

(b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and

(c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

Mandatory Price Conditions

1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1—

(a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;

(b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula—

$$P=D+(D \times V)$$

where—

(i) P is the permitted price,

(ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and

(iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

(c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence—

(i) the holder of the premises licence,

(ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or

(iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

(d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

(e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.

3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

4.—(1) Paragraph 2 applies where the permitted price given by sub-paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax. (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

ANNEX 2 – CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE

Prevention of Crime and Disorder

1. Colour digital CCTV, with a picture quality capable of being used for evidence, will be installed to cover all internal areas of the premises, including point(s) of sale and all entrances/exits, and any external areas used for licensable activities or where outside seating is provided. The CCTV will be operational at all times the premises is open to the public.

2. CCTV recordings will be retained for a minimum of 30 days and made available in a viewable format to any authorised authority on request.

3. When the premises is open to the public there will always be a member of staff on site who is trained in the operation of the CCTV system and is able to provide recordings in a viewable format to any authorised authority on request.
4. There will be signage in the premises, clearly visible to members of the public, which states that CCTV is in operation.
5. The Premises will have a zero tolerance to drugs policy, the Licence Holder shall display notices at the entrances to the premises advising attendees that the police will be informed if anyone is found in possession of controlled substances.
6. Drugs found will be placed in a suitable locked receptacle kept for that purpose. Means for securing and unlocking the receptacle will be held by the Premises Licence Holder or a nominated responsible person. A record shall be made of the date and time of the find, the person who made the find and the person who secured the found item(s). This record will be made available to any authorised authority on request.
7. The Premises Licence Holder shall make suitable arrangements with the police for the collection of any found items as soon as possible after they are found.

Public Safety

1. Details of local taxi firms to be displayed to customers within the main retail area of the premises.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

1. The external area will be cleared of all patrons by 23:00.
2. No glass bottles will be transferred into external waste bins after 21:00.
3. Any external speakers will be at a low level and positioned to minimise the impact on noise sensitive receptors.
4. There will be no deliveries or collections associated with the business before 07:00 and after 23:00.
5. Prominent, clear and legible notices will be displayed at the exit requesting the public to respect the needs of nearby residents and to leave the premises and the area quietly.
6. Any rubbish associated with the premises will be cleared up from the front pavement every evening before close.
7. All windows and doors must be closed between 23:00 and 07:00 except for access and egress.

Protection of Children from Harm

1. A Challenge 25 Policy will be implemented with appropriate signage displayed at points of sale.
2. A challenge log for Challenge 25 and refusals will be maintained and made available to any authorised authority on request. The challenge log can be kept either electronically or in a hard backed/bound book.
3. Training on the Challenge 25 procedures, proxy sales and their responsibilities under the licensing act 2003 will be held for all persons supplying alcohol.
4. Refresher training on Challenge 25, proxy sales and their responsibilities under the licensing act 2003 to be provided no less than annually. Training records retained and available at the premises to any authorised authority on request.
5. All persons under 18 must be accompanied by an adult at all times.

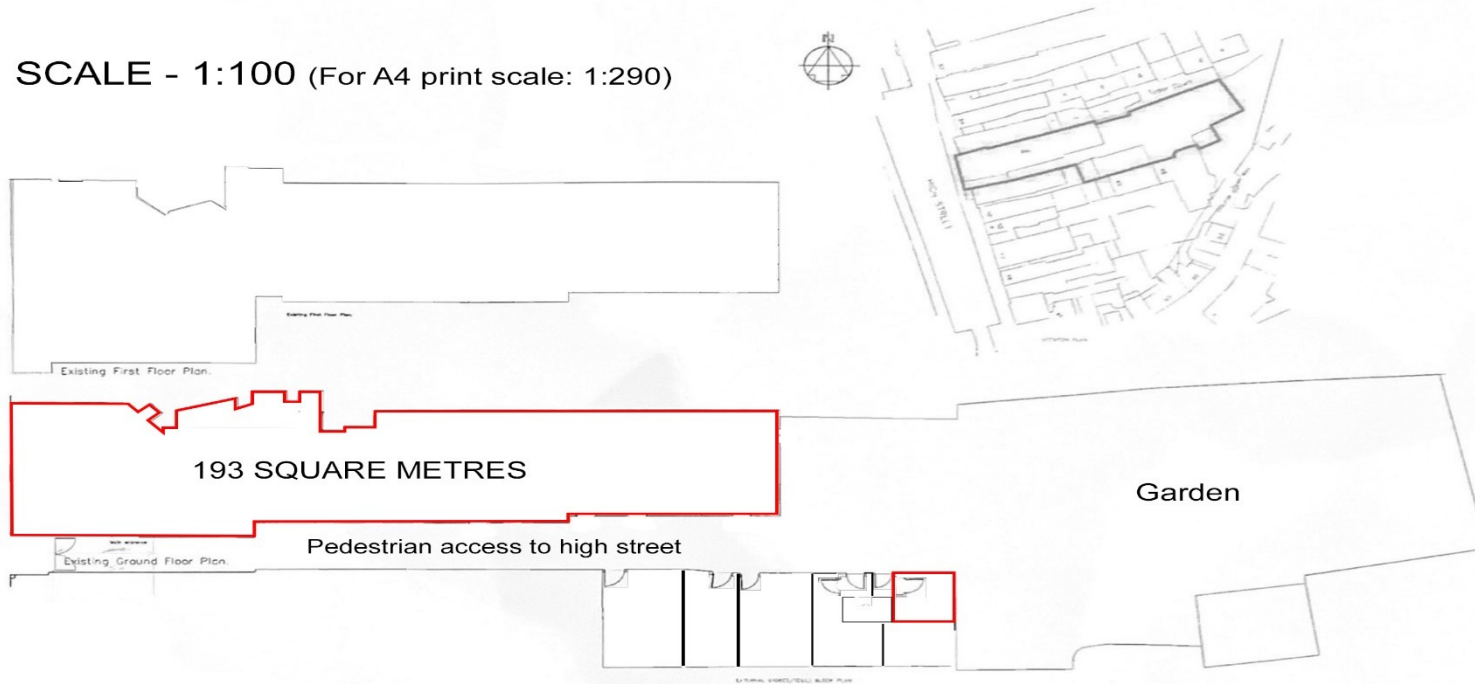

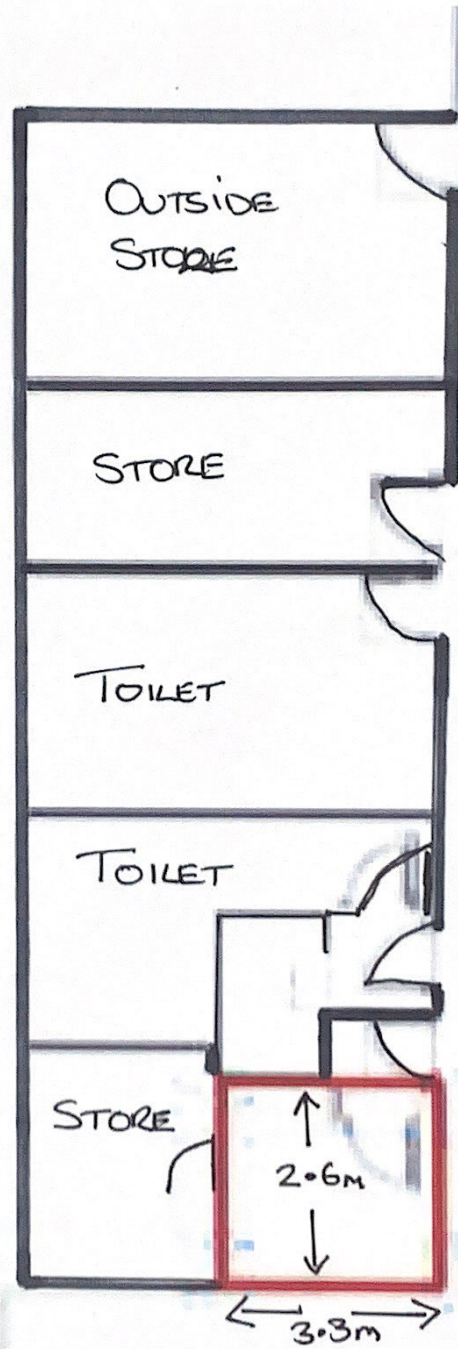

ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION OBJECTION NOTICE

TEMPORARY EVENT 5 SEPTEMBER 2026

THE GREENHOUSE, 52 HIGH STREET, BRIDGNORTH

I, Robert BOWLAND, acting as the Responsible Authority with Shropshire Council for the Licensing objective The Prevention of Public Nuisance, hereby give notice of objection to a Temporary Event Notice received by Shropshire Council on 5 August 2026 in the name of Paul Atkins, who is the DPS at The Greenhouse, for an outdoor event from 14:00 – 20:30 on Saturday the 5th of September 2026

The venue has a Premises Licence 24/00092/LVDPD that authorises the venue to stay open to 01:00 Sunday to Wednesday and 01:30 Thursday to Saturday. The Licence permits Recorded music until 01:00 indoors.

A condition in Annex 2 of the Premises Licence requires “*The external area will be cleared of all patrons by 23:00*” There is no provision in the Licence to permit Recorded Music, such as a DJ in the outside area (other than incidental / background music)

I am of the opinion that allowing the Premises to be used in accordance with the TEN (Application Number 62580) will undermine the Licensing Objective - The Prevention of Public Nuisance.

The basis for my objection and evidence to support my opinion that the Licensing objective will be undermined is given below:

The Premises traded for many years as Prezzo restaurant which closed during Covid. The Premises reopened as The Old Swan Pub in 2021 and then in 2024 the business changed to The Greenhouse with the current proprietors who have experience of running bars and nightclubs in Wolverhampton.

Noise complaints were received from 2 residents of Tudor Court in relation to the “*I love the 80’s*” outdoor event on Sunday 24th May 2026, and an additional 6 residents contacted the Council to lodge a formal noise complaint about the “*El Casa White Event*” held on Saturday 6 June 2026. Complaints were received from residents whose properties are within 5m of the Greenhouse garden, as well as addresses some distance from the venue on Cartway and Friars Street. The noise is reported as being highly disturbing and intrusive preventing residents being able to enjoy their properties.

The photograph shown at the end of this document was taken from a resident's garden and shows how close the venue is to properties and also shows the size of the speakers that are used for outdoor events.

In view of these reports and subsequent complaints, Officers from the Environmental Protection Team have undertaken noise monitoring of 2 recent events held outside on a TEN, namely the El Casa Party on the 18th of July 2026, scheduled to run from 14:00 to 20:00 and the Indie Bash Disco on the 25 July 2026 scheduled to run from 17:00 to 22:00.

The noise from the events was sufficiently intrusive and impactful on the residents of nearby properties that in line with our Statutory Duties under the Environmental Protection Act 1990 a Section 80 Noise Abatement Notice was served on the parent company that runs the Greenhouse, namely Cocktail Club Ltd, and copied to the 3 Directors all of whom are actively involved in the day to day running of the business, including Paul Atkins who is the Designated Premises Supervisor and who has submitted the TEN for the 5th September 2026.

Unless appealed the notice requires abatement of the nuisance by the 31st August 2026

Breach of an Abatement Notice is a Criminal Offence and on conviction in the Magistrates Court a person who commits an offence on industrial, trade or business premises will be liable on summary conviction to an unlimited fine.

To provide context this is the first Noise Abatement Notice that the Environmental Protection Team has served on a Licenced Premises in 5 years.... which illustrates the extreme nature of the noise disturbance to nearby residents.

This TEN represents a further intensification of the site from a pub beer garden to an entertainment site for hosting outdoor parties. The TEN seeks to authorise licensable activities of playing recorded music by having a DJ set up in the rear garden of the Premises. The Premises benefits from off sales so the sale of alcohol is not needed on the TENS

The TEN is in addition to a batch of TENS received and issued earlier in the year, as detailed below.

Sunday 5th April 2026

Saturday 2 May 2026 & Sunday 3rd May

Saturday 23 May & Sunday 24 May

Saturday 6 June

Saturday 27 June

Saturday 18th July

Saturday 25 July
Saturday 1st August
Saturday 29 August & Sunday 30 August

The times given on the TENs listed above are 17:00 to 22:00, apart from the first El Casa event on the 6th of June 2026 that ran from 14:00 to 20:00.

The TEN that I am objecting to on the 5th September 2026 follows a weekend of events only a week before at the end of August. If granted The Greenhouse would have had outside musical entertainment in the form of a DJ or a Live music for 4 of the previous 6 weekends.

To illustrate the intensification of the use of the site, the number of TENs issued since The Greenhouse opened is as follows:

2024 0
2025 1 TEN issued covering 1 day
2026 9 TENs issued covering 12 days.

I should add that in addition to the events that feature recorded music played by a DJ for which a TEN is required, the venue also has outdoor bands and other entertainment in the outdoor space such as comedy nights.

A Robbie Williams tribute band is planned for Friday 14th August 2026 and a UB40 tribute is booked to play on an outdoor stage on the outdoor stage on Saturday 29th August 2026. Live music outdoors until 23:00 does not require specific authorisation on the Premises Licence but can represent a public nuisance and adds to the disturbance experienced by residents throughout the summer.

The venue also showed the England World cup games outside on a big screen. The England v Mexico game on the 3rd of July didn't kick off until 1 am UK time. While the showing of live football is not Regulated entertainment, no TEN was applied for to extend the use of the garden past the 23:00 closure time specified in the Premises Licence.

The rear garden of The Greenhouse is bounded by residential properties on 2 sides. I have attached a map that shows the Greenhouse garden as a green space, and which illustrates how close residential properties are. Monitoring of previous events has shown that the music noise is intrusive and disturbing within peoples' properties on Tudor Court which is directly next to the outdoor space. Even with windows and doors closed it is possible to clearly hear the lyrics of the songs being played.

My concerns relate to the intensification of the site for use as an outdoor party space with regular DJs. These events are advertised on social media and cannot be

considered incidental to other activities. Advertising for these events taken from social media are reproduced on subsequent pages to give a flavour as to the nature of the event with the words Party and Ibiza being used. The EL Casa White Party featured 5 DJs with tickets being sold on a well-known national event ticketing sites.

For clarity I wish to add that I have no objection to events taking place inside the venue, my objection relates solely to the use of the rear garden as a party venue with DJs playing music at high volumes such that it is highly disturbing to neighbours giving rise to public nuisance.

An informal agreement was reached with the previous proprietor of the venue, when it was The Old Swan Pub that the outdoor space should not be used for events more than 6 times a year and that nearby residents would be notified in advance. The current proprietors of the business do not inform neighbours of when events are taking place, and they have to find out via social media.

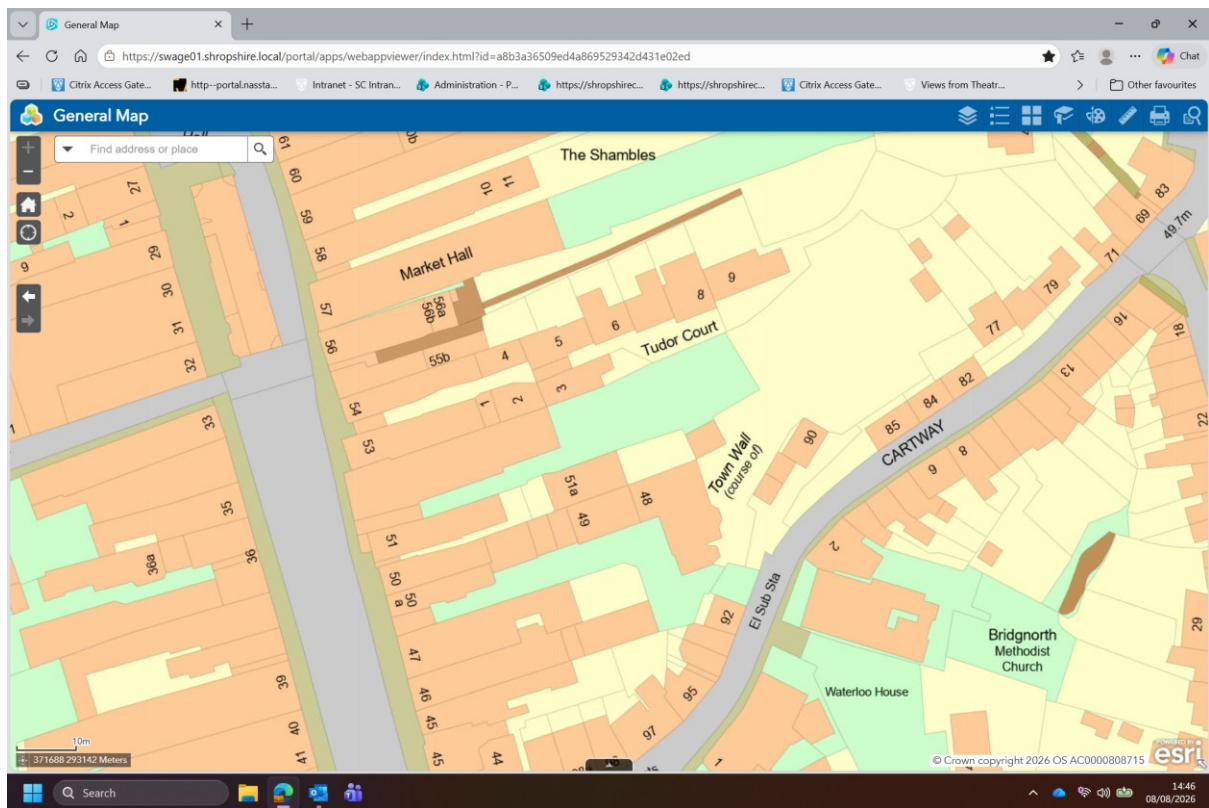
The site is surrounded by residential property on 2 sides. A business model that wishes to use the outdoor space to the rear of the venue as a entertainment / party space on a regular basis is not compatible with the location in a market town and gives rise to significant noise impacts which affects both the immediate neighbours that have direct line of sight into the beer garden and also properties further away most notably on Cartway.

A balance has to be struck between the wishes of the venue to host outdoor events and the understandable desire of residents to enjoy a reasonable degree of quiet in their properties without suffering from intrusive noise. It is my view that this additional TEN which represents a further intensification of the site, further undermines the Licensing objectives – The Prevention of Public Nuisance.

To uphold the Licensing objective The Prevention of Public Nuisance I would urge the sub-committee to issue a counter-notice to prevent the event going ahead.
