# Ukrainian Refugee Resettlement Schemes Update – 10 May 2022

The number of Ukrainian arrivals applying for school places in Shropshire schools is steadily increasing. The latest position as at the end of last week is summarised below.

Thank you to schools for sending through information on in-year applications they have received from Ukrainian refugee families to the local authority email address - <u>Children&youngpeople@shropshire.gov.uk</u>. Whether supported by an offer or refused, this information is important, with refusals being directed towards a fair access panel. A panel met last Friday to consider an application.

The Government has requested local authorities submit the numbers on applications received and places offered. The information summarised above was sent through on Friday. In an all-LA call last Tuesday, a Department for Education official advised that funding support for school placements will be confirmed and distributed later this term.

A <u>letter from the Secretary of State for Education</u> was published week. It references the <u>Oak National Academy</u> online lessons, advising that an auto-translate function across all 10,000 of these lessons has been rolled out. The letter also advises that the Ukrainian Ministry of Education and Science has published the <u>Ukrainian curriculum</u>, through which Ukrainian educational materials can be shared with incoming families and pupils.

Following a brief discussion with senior leaders at the LA Maintained Headteacher Forum last Thursday, the following developments are being proposed, which were supported by the headteacher group:

# Grant for uniforms/education resources

Funding from the Household Support Fund has been earmarked to provide a one-off grant of £50 per Ukrainian refugee securing a school place, to support with the costs of uniforms and education resources. This funding will be paid to the schools in which the pupils secure places.

# Free school meals

The local authority is seeking clarification from the Department of Education on the provision of free school meals (FSMs) for Ukrainian refugees once they start in school, but has yet to receive any clear guidance. Given that the families are likely to have arrived without independent means of supporting themselves financially, they are being strongly advised to apply for Universal Credit as soon as they arrive. Once this is confirmed they will be able to formally apply for FSMs. However, the confirmation of the benefit entitlement is not likely to come through ahead of children taking up their school place.

Schools are therefore being asked to provide the Ukrainian children with FSMs from day 1 of their arrival in school, in the expectation that their entitlement to Universal Credit and subsequent confirmed eligibility for FSMs, following receipt of the application, will follow in due course. If the local authority is advised that a family is not entitled to FSMs, the school will be notified immediately at which point the provision of FSMs can cease.

Schools are not being mandated to do this but will hopefully support this approach given the exceptional circumstances in which these families are arriving in our county. This proposal was discussed at the LA Maintained Headteacher Forum last Thursday, who gave it their full support.

# **DBS checks**

In order to increase the capacity for dealing with the enhanced DBS checks required for adults in households hosting Ukrainian families, we are inviting schools to put themselves forward to undertake ID checks for hosts in their local area, using staff in their schools who are already trained to verify individual's identification documents for DBS purposes. The hope is that hosts can get these checks done more quickly and effectively in their own communities.

These checks must be kept completely separate from a school's own DBS checking process and the adults checked should not be added to the school's single central register. It is envisaged that a slightly different access permission and account would be created for each user, to ensure that there is no disruption to school DBS checks, or risks in relation to confidentiality of information held across both datasets.

If there is high demand for your support with ID verification and it adversely affects school workloads, please let Maria know so that she can either provide you with additional DBS support from within her team, or to review monthly payroll deadlines with you.
