Transition Day

Our annual Transition Day was a huge success. The aim of the day is to discuss transition to secondary school in order to prepare the Year 6 pupils and to provide the Year 7 pupils with a forum to share experiences and build upon these. It is really beneficial for the Year 6 pupils to have the opportunity to learn the language of secondary school, to advance their understanding and ability to explain their hearing loss and audiological equipment and to share their experience with a group of similarly aged children who also have a hearing loss and wear hearing devices, use radio aids/FM systems.

We played games, made new friends and had lots of fun!. For lunch this year we made pizzas which proved popular with the children. The staff were very surprised to learn that pineapple doesn't belong on a pizza!

Tammy did a fabulous job of explaining her hearing loss and how the ear works to her peers.

A huge thank you to SDCS again for funding the day.





Last week, Alice took part in a lesson for her class all about hearing aids and what it is like to wear them. Her new teacher for September also came to the lesson and found it really useful to know how to support Alice next year.

Alice has had an amazing year in school - she has started using an FM system to help her concentrate in lessons, and her teachers say it has made an enormous difference and that she is developing excellent independent skills.

The school year has ended with Alice winning a poetry competition for her year group, where she had to recite a poem in front of the whole school. She showed so much confidence - Alice's family, her teachers and her Teacher of the Deaf are all very proud of her!



Eden will join Reception in September 2023 and is excited to be starting school. She has made tremendous progress with her spoken language over the past 18 months. She now confidently and enthusiastically chats away about her family and nursery activities. She enjoys sharing books and playing games. She is a regular attender at SIS Family Group alongside her parents and younger sister. She has made many friends there and is very comfortable in this environment.

SDCS was set up over 66 years ago by Edwin Owen following a chance encounter with a 12 year old deaf girl with no speech which occurred while he was serving with the Army in Italy during WW2. Upon his return to England Mr Owen trained as an ear, nose and throat surgeon and later moved to work at the Royal Shrewsbury Hospital. The charity is still going strong and continues to support hearing impaired children and their families across Shropshire and Telford & Wrekin. The Margy Lloyd Achievement Award

Lincoln is profoundly deaf and wears two Nucleus 7 processors. He also uses an FM system. Lincoln is now a consistent hearing device wearer and takes part daily when his equipment is checked by an adult. He also took part in a deaf awareness session with his class and the Teacher of the Deaf. Lincoln is very popular with his family, extended family and with the adults and children at school. He has a warm and friendly smile and an infectious giggle! He has a wonderful sense of humour! He is a pleasure to support. Lincoln has worked hard with his physical challenges and can now get in and out of his wheelchair independently. He loves to ride his trundle bike in the outside area of his classroom! Lincoln has made tremendous progress with his ability to communicate. He is now using 3 word utterances and is asking questions. Well done Lincoln!





Thomas is a year 5 pupil. He is profoundly deaf and has two cochlear implants. He is part of a big family that go on lots of exciting trips and adventures. Thomas is working very well alongside his hearing peers in school and making good all-round progress. Next year, Thomas and his family are moving to

Uganda for 6 months.

Thomas will be close to the Equator, will be living near some of the most beautiful places in the world and be surrounded by exotic wild life.

We look forward to his return in March 2024 and hearing all about his adventures.



The Andrew Broughton Award

Ben has been supported by SIS for many years for his one-sided hearing loss. He and his mum became concerned that his hearing worsened in his good ear, and he made the mature decision to try a hearing aid. He took to it straight away without any fuss and now has an FM system to help him concentrate in noisy lessons at school. He might also try a crosaid if all goes well with this aid. In school, Ben is always charming to work with. His teachers report that he is one of the kindest people they know, is always looking out for other people and being responsible. He works hard at all times and never fails to do his best. He always presents as cheerful, polite and happy and should be congratulated for his mature attitude.





Ben has settled really well in his new school. He is working really hard to use his voice more and is now communicating well in school both with adults and his peers. He loves listening to music and dancing. He is always a happy little boy with a lovely sense of humour. He is kind to his friends and shows a lot of empathy for someone so young. He wears his hearing aids really well and is always happy to let his Teacher of the Deaf check them and re-fit them in school.



The Kimberley Jones Award



When Grace was first referred to SIS in 2016 she presented with a mild hearing loss in both ears. However, since that time, her hearing loss has progressed. This caused a lot of anxiety and strain both on her and the rest of her family, and several emotional appointments were had in clinics as she struggled to make sense of her worsening hearing. She has now decided to explore cochlear implants, and is expecting to have them fitted later this year. With so much going on in her life, Grace would be forgiven if she had a wobble or two! However, this is not the case. She has shown amazing strength of character, determination and fortitude. She has accepted her hearing loss and done her own extensive research around deafness and cochlear implants. She is beginning to teach herself sign language and has made contact with a number of other deaf teenagers via on-line forums to get their insights and advice around implants.

Her consultant at Birmingham Children's Hospital described Grace, after only one meeting, as 'a remarkable young woman.' She certainly is, and deserves every accolade.



Eisa as he is generally known, is a very popular and visible year 8 student at his secondary school. Eisa has a severe hearing loss that is bordering profound levels. He is a positive and cheerful presence in school; he engages with his peers and likes to chat and comment on things going on around him. This year he has really worked hard to try to understand topics and focus in lessons. His teachers are impressed with his efforts to listen and willingness to answer questions, even if he does go off on a tangent! He is a delightful boy and fully deserves this prize!

The SDCS Further Education Achievement Award



Bradley has been involved with a Teacher of the Deaf since he was diagnosed at birth with a profound hearing loss. He was implanted at 17 months old.

Bradley has progressed through all the stages of mainstream education, from Nursery to primary and then secondary to college. He is now nearing the end of his BTEC level 3 Computer Science course and is on track for a strong Pass and or Merit award. This has not been an easy journey for Bradley. He has worked hard to develop his communication and language skills. As a student to work with, he has always been straightforward and easy to get along with. He is a very modest young man and has acquired very good interpersonal skills. His family are rightly very proud of all that he has achieved firstly as a polite and charming young man and also as a hard working student who has shown application to his studies. We wish Bradley every success in his future plans, whatever they may be.



This award has been given to Adam because of the fantastic independence he has shown since attending College. He has a superb 'can do' attitude which has shone in the way he takes sole responsibility for all his hearing aid equipment and it's maintenance, alerting the relevant people when there is an issue. Also for all his out of college ventures, from stewarding at football games to working regularly at his local pub.

Please send photos and news of your children – it means a lot to other parents, especially those who are new to the world of hearing aids, hospital appointments and hearing loss. The achievements of all of the children/young people are inspirational and help carry other parents through those days when they don't know what lies ahead.

Many of the new children being supported by the service have temporary hearing loss and some are awaiting grommet surgery, the fitting of hard band aids provides much needed auditory stimulus in the meantime and allows their speech and language to develop. Regular meetings with the hospital allows us to raise any audiological concerns around children and support appointment attendance. Please put appointments in diaries – every time a child does not attend an appointment it is a session that could have been offered to another family. Please remember to cancel if you can't make it!

Both Shropshire Local Authority and Telford and Wrekin have now been reviewed by OFSTED. The inspectors visited our family group in March and unsurprisingly received a very warm welcome (even got some of Nicky's great cakes) and were inspired by the warmth and honesty of the parents they met there. Thank you to those of you who were there and as ever to our wonderful Family Group team of Hazel, Nicky and Mark.

All that remains is to wish you all a wonderful summer with your families – we have been blessed with this period of fantastic weather – let's hope it doesn't change just when we break up for summer.
