Kathryn Lightwood



I have recently joined the team as a Social Worker and am currently learning the role. I have spoken to a few Special Guardian's already, and really look forward to speaking with more of you...and hopefully meeting some of you face to face at our next coffee morning.

I qualified as a Social Worker in 2008, spending two years with Powys Local Authority, working in case management in the Children and Families Team.

I then moved to Fostering, working in the independent sector, starting as a Supervising Social Worker and progressing to Deputy Manager. During this time, I supported the 'step-down' process, for children moving from a residential provision to a foster family, something I felt, and still do, feel passionately about.

More recently I spent three years as an Assessment Manager, working across the midlands, before moving to Shropshire in my current role. I'm excited about this opportunity. I have lots to share, and lots to learn...a good combination I think!

The Adoption and special Guardian Fund (ASGSF) previously called the Adoption Support Fund (ASF)

The ASGSF provides funds to Local Authorities to pay essential therapeutic services to address the impact of trauma/attachment. This is available where a child has previously been 'Looked After' but is now subject to an adoption order, SGO or Child Arrangements Order. Any application is subject to an SGO Assessment of Need to explore the need and eligibility. Please contact the SGO Support Team if you wish to discuss. Pupil Premium

Introduced in 2011, the Pupil Premium is a sum of money given to schools each year by the Government to improve the attainment of eligible children.

This is based on research showing that children from low-income families perform less well at school than their peers.

Often, children who are entitled to pupil premium face challenges such as poor language and communication skills, lack of confidence and issues with attendance and punctuality. The pupil premium is intended to directly benefit the children who are eligible, helping to narrow the gap between them and their classmates.

Pupil Premium Plus:

This funding should be allocated direct to the child's school for a child who was looked after in care immediately before the granting of an SGO. You are responsible for making the child's school aware:

- That the child was classed as a child Looked After immediately before the SGO was granted
- That the school may therefore claim Pupil Premium Plus.

Pupil Premium funds are allocated directly to the school and the school directly manages the funds. The Virtual School/Virtual School Head is not involved. The child's Designated Teacher at the School should involve you in deciding how Pupil Premium Plus is used to support the child.

That teacher should be the main point of contact for queries about the Pupil Premium Plus funds and how they are used. It is important to note that Pupil Premium Plus is not a personal budget for individual children, therefore the school may decide to use it in a way that they think benefits all children who have been previously Looked After and according to children's needs.

<u>Please ensure the school records any eligible child in your care on the October</u> <u>Census for this each year to be paid to the school the following April.</u>

Shropshire Virtual School

The Virtual School acts as a local authority champion to promote the progress and educational attainment of looked-after children so they achieve educational outcomes comparable to their peers. Ensuring that they receive a high-quality education is the foundation for improving their lives.

The school doesn't exist in real terms or as a building. Children don't attend it - they remain the responsibility of the school at which they're enrolled. The Virtual School is simply a team which has been created for the effective co-ordination of educational services at a strategic and operational level.

As from September 2018 there are now new duties for children previously looked after (PLAC). The Virtual School will be able to offer advice and information regarding the education of children living in Shropshire who were previously in care and are now subject to an adoption, special guardianship, or child arrangement order.

This means the Virtual School can:

- Respond to parental requests for advice and information, for example advice on school admissions in their area.
- Respond to requests for advice and information from providers of early education, designated teachers in maintained schools and academies, and providers of alternative provision in their area about individual children supported by the local authority. The VSH should develop or build on existing good working relationships with designated teachers for previously looked-after children in their area.

• Make general advice and information available to early years settings and schools to improve awareness of the vulnerability and needs of previously looked-after children, including good practice on identifying and meeting their needs, and guidance on effective use of the pupil premium plus.

Not having parental responsibility for these children, the Virtual School wouldn't be entitled to monitor them, and the duties don't extend to taking on case work or actions. However, we aim to empower all our parents with the advice, information, and expertise that we've gathered, whilst supporting our children in care to ensure that all the children in our remit can fulfil their potential in school.

Shropshire Council is part of a 'regional permanence partnership' – Together4Chidlren - with Telford and Wrekin, Stoke and Staffordshire. Please see the education support section on the Togther4Children website where you'll find resources and a link to the Education Planning tool (EP-PLAC), which can be used as a good practice tool in schools.

Priority School Admissions/Support in School

Children who have previously been Looked After must be given priority for admission to the school of their carer's choice. Therefore, if changing schools or transitioning to secondary School, Special Guardians should make it clear on any admission forms that the Child/ren were previously Looked After and now subject to an SGO. There should be a Designated Teacher within the School who should be the initial point of contact to promote the child's education. They have responsibility for ensuring school staff understand and are supportive of children who were previously in the care system and subject to an SGO.

Sleep Tight Workshops.

The Parenting Team is offering free 5 week SLEEP TIGHT workshops either face to face to online from February 2024

These 5 week workshops cover:

- Recognising the role of sleep hygiene to improve sleep
- Identifying causes of sleep issues and appropriate practical strategies to try
- Completing sleep diaries and identifying potential sleep issues

Information to help families.

We wanted to give you an update on the Family Information Service (FIS), because although we've been running for nearly 24 years, there's still lots of families, and those supporting families, who don't fully know what we can offer and how we can help.

The Family information Service (FIS) is here to give families the info and resources they need to help their family life run a little smoother. We can help with anything and everything





to do with family life, whether that's something for parents or something for the children and young people. We are a free, universal service so anyone can use us. If you have a question, we are likely to be able to help find out information on services of support or resources, and we have some great tools for practitioners to be able to provide families with information themselves.

We can provide information on a wide range of topics, such as:

- Finding and paying for Ofsted registered childcare, including childminders, day nurseries, pre-school playgroups, out of school clubs and holiday clubs.
- Local baby and toddler groups
- Parenting support to understanding your pregnancy, or child/teen, their sleep, mental health
- Events, clubs, activities, and fun things to do in the school holidays, for all ages
- Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND)
- Family finances and the costs of living
- Family support such as relationships, bereavement
- Physical health and emotional wellbeing and mental health support
- Family relationships



This transformative hub is not just a physical space; it represents our commitment to providing comprehensive support, empowering the youth to unlock their full potential in education and employment. Together, we are shaping a future where opportunities and aspirations become a reality.

This is a fantastic opportunity for 16–24-year-old The Youth Hub team will be on hand to support young people through four key areas:

- Qualifications & training
- Health & wellbeing support
- Work experience
- Regular support sessions

DWP Work Coaches will be based at the hub who will be working closely with the Shrewsbury Foundation team. The hub will also take self-referrals, scan the QR code and complete the form.



Holiday Activities and Food Programme (HAF)

The HAF Programme in Shropshire: free holiday activities and food for eligible children and young people

Over the Easter/spring, summer and Christmas/winter holidays, schools, voluntary and community organisations and childcare providers are running holiday clubs across the county.

There are free places available on the HAF programme for children and young people aged four (reception class age) to 16, who are eligible for benefits-related free school meals.

There are also a limited number of free places available for children and young people on the HAF programme living in areas of high deprivation and/or from low-income households who are not in receipt of benefits related free school meals. These children and young people can be referred onto the programme by a professional. Measles – are you protected?

With an increase in cases of measles being seen across the West Midlands it's Families across Shropshire are being urged to check that you and your family members are up to date with their MMR vaccine.

Measles is a **very infectious** viral disease which means it can spread quickly among communities, such as schools and nurseries **if** people have **not** had two dose the MMR vaccine.

Children are offered the first vaccination at one year, and the second dose at three years and four months.

You can check whether you or your child are up to date with the MMR vaccines by looking in your child's personal child health record (PCHR), known as the <u>red book</u>, through the NHS app, or by contacting your GP practice. If anyone has missed one or both doses of the MMR vaccine, they should contact their GP practice to book an appointment. It's never too late to catch up.

About measles

- The first signs of measles are:
- high temperature
- runny or blocked nose
- sneezing
- cough
- red, sore, watery eyes
- rash, which usually appears a few days after cold-like symptoms (sometimes it starts around the ears before spreading to the rest of the body)

What to do if you think your child has measles

- Contact your GP by phone or call NHS 111 for advice.
- Please do not just turn up to your GP, walk-in centre, or any other healthcare setting without calling ahead, as measles is very infectious – the doctor will make special arrangements to see your child so that, if they have measles, they won't pass it to others.
- People remain infectious until at least 4 days after the onset of the rash so they should stay off nursery/ school/ university/ work/ other group activities until then.


